I also want to thank Sue Long for doing extra duty for both the AV services and the belfry during the interim. We will begin advertising that position in October and hope to fill the position soon.

We also plan to start new task forces this month to update our bylaws and another group to update our Safe Church policy. If anyone has any interest in joining one of these committees, please let me know. I appreciate those who have already volunteered to serve on these committees and I look forward to us beginning the work!

I look forward to seeing everyone around as our fall routines (like football games) continue and our church continues to thrive!

$\mathsf{STEWARDSHIP}$. . . is the Care and Nurture of Something So That It Will Last

The first three paragraphs that follow, were taken almost word for word from a national United Church of Christ website / Stewardship resources. Specifically, this was from a letter from a Maryland UCC Stewardship Committee to their own congregation.



Congregations that approach financial stewardship from a biblical perspective do not view the money that Christians give to their church merely as a way to pay its bills. Rather, such congregations see financial contributions as a way to help people grow spiritually in their relationship with God by supporting their church's mission and ministry with a percentage of their incomes.

Each year, our congregation's stewardship and generosity committee promotes a Consecration Sunday Stewardship Program as a way to teach the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving, in our furtherance of understanding the value of good stewardship.

Consecration Sunday is based on the biblical philosophy of the need of the giver to give for his or her own spiritual development, rather than on the need of the church to receive. Instead of treating people like members of a social club who should pay dues, we strive to treat people like followers of Jesus Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of discipleship. Consecration Sunday encourages people toward proportionate and systematic giving in response to the question, "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?"

For many years we, here at Sanbornton Congregational Church, UCC have followed a similar program involving a Consecration Sunday in our fall schedule. While deciding what we should give back to God is truly a prayful and year-round consideration, the timing of asking for pledging for the coming year and blessing those pledges, also greatly assists our Finance Committee in planning a church budget that we can live with and continue God's work in the upcoming year.

Many people follow Sanbornton Congregational Church online via the live streaming of our weekly services on YOU-Tube channel. We also encourage any and all who are able to attend in person, especially on Consecration Sunday to witness the blessing of our pledges. Our church uses these pledges to plan for and continue to carry on God's work in our community and outreach to those in need in the world beyond. If you are not currently on our member's or mailing list, but want some information, please just request and we will be happy to send via email.

We are planning our Consecration Sunday Celebration on November 9th, when we can bring our pledges to church and have them blessed, and where we would love to have you join us and follow up at a special coffee fellowship. An informative packet will be available approximately two weeks before. This info may be obtained at our October 26th, Sunday service at 10 am - we'd love to see you OR it may be mailed or emailed to you on or after Monday, Oct. 27th, for your review and prayerful consideration.



TIDBITS OF HISTORY

Sanbornton Church 1771 - present



FROM THE CHURCH HISTORIAN



Did you know that Sanbornton's Centre Cemetery is part of our church's history?

Back in the early days of our town (1770's), the original "Meetinghouse" (what they called the church back then) was located further up on Tower Hill than it's current location.

In 1783, the Centre Cemetery was placed in a position adjacent to that original "Meetinghouse". It was very common for burial grounds to be on the same property as the church.

In 1834, the old Meetinghouse was taken down and rebuilt in its current location.

In 1838, a letter was written to the Town Selectmen, requesting that the land once occupied by the Meetinghouse be used to expand the burial grounds.

The request was granted.

Today, you can still see (and use) the original stone steps that once led to the Meetinghouse!

OCTOBER FÜLL MOON



Genesis 1:14 - And God said, Let there be lights in the firmament of the heaven to divide the day from the night; and let them be for signs, and for seasons, and for days, and years..."

Native Americans were very spiritually in tune with nature and often used moon phases and cycles to keep track of the seasons. They gave unique names to each recurring full moon, which were used to identify each month and keep track of seasons.

Look for the "Full Harvest Supermoon" on October 6th!

The full Moon that happens nearest to the Fall Equinox (September 22 or 23) always takes on the name "Harvest Moon". Unlike other full Moons, this full Moon rises at nearly the same time—around sunset—for several evenings in a row, giving farmers several extra evenings of moonlight and allowing them to finish their harvests before the frosts of fall arrive. Native American tribes also called this the Corn Moon because the corn is harvested around this time of year. It was also called the Barley Moon, this is the time to harvest and thresh ripened barley. Other Native American full Moon names for this month include:

- "Moon When the Plums Are Scarlet" by the Lakota Sioux.
- "Moon When the Deer Paw the Earth" by the Omaha.
- "Moon When the Calves Grow Hair" by the Sioux.

Cool October night sky events you won't want to miss....

Two meteor showers peak in October! The Draconids peak around Oct 8 but will be mostly lost in the full Moon's glare, and the Orionids peak Oct 21–22. With no bright Moon to interfere, conditions will be ideal – observers can expect 10–20 fast meteors per hour at peak.

Three Featured Comets: Comet 3I/ATLAS (discovered July 2025) will reach perihelion Oct 30, with astronomers estimating its nucleus at >3 miles wide, with a mass of ~33 billion tons! It will then pass behind the Sun, reappearing in December. You'll need good binoculars or a telescope for best results. Two other comets, SWAN (C/2025 R2) and Lemmon (C/2025 A6), will also brighten the night sky. SWAN reaches its closest Earth approach on Oct 19 but remains very dim without a telescope. Comet Lemmon rounds closest to Earth on Oct 21, and it could brighten even further by Nov 8. This implies naked-eye visibility under dark skies! Get out and enjoy some of God's night sky beauty!

ADVENTURERS AMONG US

Portland, ME to Isles of Shoals

Much of this trip can be single-hand sailing, but there are many times when one needs a "First Mate" to provide that extra set of eyes, and hands to handle the lines or the tiller. Plus, there's safety



in numbers. This was to be the fourth (and final) long voyage for me and the **Seacluse**. Polly was brave enough to step up and help me accomplish one last long sail, 58 miles. That's 10 hours +/- on the water. The unusual wind direction was from North by North East and the waves were rougher than predicted. but visually clear. Once we passed Cape Elizabeth, we were about 3 - 4 miles out from the mainland for our straightest, shortest route. Admittedly, we left the dock in Portland later than planned to assure arrival in Gosport Harbor before sunset. As we passed Biddeford Pool, where we could have picked up a transient mooring and spent the night, we decided to push onward. With 4 hours a 'til sunset, 5 hours of travel light, we were cutting it close to arrive before dark!



As we approached the northern end of Appledore Island, this moon rose up out of the ocean and became our light to travel by. That, and Polly was posted out on the bow with flashlight in hand. I know Gosport Harbor well, including 30 feet of hidden ledge extending out into the water from Malaga Island, however I've never piloted that boat into the harbor in the dark. I think both of us were praying for God's guidance!

Sometimes (actually ALWAYS) faith is REALLY important. This muted "orangy" moonlight wasn't a lot of help 'til it rose a bit higher in the sky. Then three flashes of light from Smuttynose Island. "They're signaling, Polly. Return 3 flashes back." She did. Another three flash exchange to confirm, so the guys would come out to meet us. It was Polly's job to highlight each mooring ball 'til we spotted ours.

Past a larger sailboat on the Portsmouth Yacht Club mooring, then past Mr. Foye's lobster boat. "There it is Polly. We have one shot at this, kiddo. I am going to "kiss" that mooring ball with the bow, then you are going to grab that line with the boat hook, then your hand and HOLD ON!" She did it! Line secured and motor off, just as my sons-in-law came up beside us in the Smuttynose skiff. Safe landing, a bite to eat, and a good night's sleep on island. Exploring next day.
